Keeping God's Word

"3 And hereby we do know that we know him, if we keep his commandments.4 He that saith, I know him, and keepeth not his commandments, is a liar, and the truth is not in him.5 But whoso keepeth his word, in him verily is the love of God perfected: hereby know we that we are in him.6 He that saith he abideth in him ought himself also so to walk, even as he walked." 1 John 2:3-6.

The truth that we know God is not according to our professing but rather our possessing of His commandments. We can believe in God and still do contrary to His will, as is the case of fallen angels. There are many who try to hide behind love rather than walk in love. To hide behind love is to use love as an excuse to cover up our unwillingness to obey God. Our profession of love then becomes a thinly-veiled disguise for sin and puts the burden on God once again to prove that He loves us by continually overlooking our sins and transgression (because we have no desire to change from our ways of living and thinking). By this, the writer of Hebrews says, "we crucify Christ anew in our flesh." Hebrews 6:6. To walk in love means that we are in agreement and the very thought of doing that which is unpleasing to the one we love is repulsive. See Amos 3:3. God's commandments were given to show us what He desires and to guide us in loving one another. See John 14:15, 22-23; 15:10-12; 1 John 2:3-5; 3:22; 5:2. If you don't like okra and I know you don't like it and I serve you okra despite anyway, am I really being mindful of your desire or dislikes?

Too many of today's messages have completely taken out the desires of God and replaced it with the desires of men. Given this carnal response, it is almost a shame to think that God "humbled" Himself to become a man to die for man's sin. Romans 5:5-8. He did this to show man His great love for mankind to save them and redeem them back into His kingdom, only to have man to say to God, "it was not enough, that was a long time ago, what are you doing for me now?" The ungrateful attitude of a people whom never seem to appreciate all that God is and all that He is doing can be summed up in a question, "Why won't men keep His commandments?"
